### The Pirates of Penzance (A Progress Report)

## NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR Bil Pfuderer Director and Designer

After having acted for several years in a G&S company under the firm hand of a D'Oyly Carte director it was with apprehension that I approached this production of *Pirates*.

The apprehension proved to be appropriate. Although I have directed over 60 musical productions, some with amateur casts and others with professionals, nothing has been as tricky or as difficult as this seemingly simple piece. ... The learning is awesome and the respect for the lasting and universal quality of the comedy grows with each rehearsal.

Perhaps my greatest challenge is to make this production accessible to a mass audience in Austin, Texas in 1991. ... [I have] a fine support staff and one of the most multitalented and sparkling casts it's ever been my pleasure to work with. ... Each rehearsal reveals some new facet of the piece or presents a new performance challenge.

Simply co-ordinating the physical demands of the work with vocal rehearsal and balance, complex dance and movement patterns, and daily diction drills is exciting and exhilarating. ... I feel a little like a gourmet cook adding some spice here, deleting an ingredient there, adjusting and preparing an old family recipe for an eagerly awaited dinner party. I'll have my fingers crossed until that moment when the ingredients come out of the oven, hopefully for the pleasure, enjoyment, and enrichment of all.

Editor's Note: Bil is well known in Austin as director, actor, and designer of both sets and costumes. He has directed the Zilker Park summer musicals for years.

He worked in the 1960's with the Skylight Comic Opera in Milwaukee, under the direction of John Denison, a former member of the D'Oyly Carte company. Denison used the D'Oyly Carte prompt books and held the cast strictly to the traditional interpretations, down to the last lift of a finger. Among other roles, Bil played the part of Dick Deadeye in Pinafore, and Jack Point, the Jester, in Yeomen of the Guard. Bil reports that it was a wonderful and rigorous experience; but the pay was low and he had to drive a cab to make ends meet.

Reports from the Production Committee: I. Carla read a list of goals for the Society articulated by the committee. (They appear in the yellow flyer cover sheet. Note misprint: more information will appear in the MAY Newsletter.)

There followed some discussion of 1) the proposed garage and bake sale; 2) a proposal to hold High Tea at the Caswell House, or a similar location, on a Sunday afternoon later in the summer. The committee suggested a large mailing to announce the next Season and the Fund Raiser (High Tea) to generate money and memberships.

II. Michael reported on all the theater spaces in Austin, including several new, small places. The Zachary Scott Theatre Center Arena Theatre is a very nice new space, with about 120 seats.

III. Norma Garza reported on the research into possible shows. Committee members had worked hard to study the less well-known operas. They all require a major investment for production. Jacki discussed the idea of doing an imaginative novelty that would cost less, and still attract the basic G&S audience. She had in mind works by either Gilbert or Sullivan, rather than the famous team. She proposed that we plan to do a small production of this kind in Fall '91, and a large, well-known work in Spring '92. This was accepted by a vote of 16 For; 1 Against; 1 Abstaining.

Jacki said she wanted us to know that President Karen had written thank-you notes to every participant in the Amster Soirée. The meeting then adjourned for delicious goodies. Thank you, Pearl, for your hospitality!

- Bob Kusnetz thanks everyone for the get-well card signed at the last meeting, and for all the good wishes. He is taking it easy and gradually improving but it's a slow process. He hopes to see everyone at the next meeting.


