#### • Message from your President •

It's that time again when feverish thought and activity are directed toward our spring production. We have the play (Iolanthe), the place (Dougherty Arts Center Theater) and the date (Thursday, April 29th). Now come the many other necessary considerations, two of which are most important: No. 1 - Assembling a high quality artistic and production team, topped by the Stage Director and Musical Director (we're getting close). No. 2 - The less glamorous but imperative necessity of raising money to pay for the production. We have a modest beginning from our Mikado production profit, the December 6th All-Star Revue Fund Raiser, and the Austin Arts Commission grant (most of which was used to buy required liability insurance).

But because *Iolanthe* and the Dougherty Arts Center Theater are not as well known as *The Mikado* and the Zachary Scott Theater, we cannot rely on these names to help attract a large audience for revenue. And yet production costs will be nearly the same as for *The Mikado*. Yes, we will save some money because rental will be less than at the Zach, but costs in general keep rising. Yet we must provide the high quality production values that our audience has come to expect and which they deserve. Remember, whether we like it or not, we are in competition with other theaters for a share of the audience dollar. Therefore I must set a goal of raising \$15,000 before opening night, to defray production costs. Please help me with this effort.
