Then President Robert Mellin made introductions around the room (with assistance from the many newcomers, who introduced themselves). Allen Lawshae then took over. Janette Jones and Matt Kaplan sang "There is beauty in the bellow of the blast" from *The Mikado*, followed by seven songs from *Gondoliers*. Allen sang the patter song "In enterprise of martial kind" with everyone helping out on the choruses. Then came two duets between Casilda and Luiz, with Janette singing Casilda in "O rapture, when alone together", and Sheila Glenn singing Casilda in "There was a time". • Message from your President •

On my first trip to England in 1970 I was excited at the prospect of possibly seeing Gilbert & Sullivan performed by the D'Oyly Carte company on their own ground. I soon discovered that was impossible because D'Oyly Carte was on tour to God knows where. I swallowed my disappointment as I was to learn to do often in my travels as well as in my regular life. After touring England I travelled on the continent until I arrived at the train station in Copenhagen, Denmark. The kiosks were papered with flyers and posters. On one poster was advertised D'Oyly Carte performing H.M.S. Pinafore at the Concert Hall. My poor heart beat rapidly as I checked the dates and Lo and Behold the performance was to be that very night. My ecstasy and enthusiasm must have been contagious because the 2 or 3 travelling Gringos that I'd met on the train decided that they had to see the show too, even though I suspect that possibly some might not even have known who Gilbert & Sullivan were. But we did manage to buy tickets and get good seats, and it was a magnificent production. There were even 5 encores for the Bell Trio. That was the first and last time I had the pleasure of seeing a D'Oyly Carte performance.

Now, if this story needed a moral lesson perhaps it might be that one should travel to find what one wants. However I'm not looking to give moral lessons. But what I would like is to know your Gilbert and Sullivan story. Where and how were you introduced to Gilbert & Sullivan? When did you first perform G&S? Musicale, April 4th, cont.

Dan Smith sang Don Alhambra's song "I stole the Prince", which explains a very important part of the plot. Janette sang Tessa's song on the joys of marriage, "When a merry maiden marries", and Julia Lawshae and Allen described how a Duke and a Duchess make a living, in the duet "To help unhappy commoners". A short diversion to *The Yeomen of the Guard* for the trio "A man who would woo a fair maid" sung by Sheila, Julia and Frank. Then back to *Gondoliers* with Don Alhambra's "There lived a King", which concludes with these words of wisdom: "When everyone is somebodee, Then no-one's anybody!"

Julia then sang "As if we never said goodbye" from Sunset Boulevard, the new musical by Andrew Lloyd Webber, which led us to our surprise treat. The entire cast of a new and original musical soon to open in Austin were present to sing us samples of their show Electric Street by Stirling Price-McKinney. Frank Delvy is appearing in this show, which might explain the connection.

Stirling took over the piano from Bob Wall, and told us that his show was an ode to Austin and to 6th Street. Karen Kuykendahl who leads the cast as Jade, the owner of The Electric Street Cafe, opened with the songs "I slept late today, as I usually do", and "Something old and something new". Frank sang "You there, out on the street!". He plays Shoe Shine, who hangs around mysteriously. "As Buttercup says - things are seldom what they seem" remarked Frank.

The others in the cast are Stacey Amorous, Leslie Scherer, Paul Parker, Rich Upton, and Martin Vasquez, who proceeded to give us several other samples from the show. The entire cast finished up with "We're dancing in the street" to enthusiastic applause. This finale to the first act is reprised to end the show. Robert thanked them all for coming and said of Karen and Stirling, "These people are the premiere Saloon Act in Austin -- the closest thing we have to cocktail lounge artists." *Electric Street* opens on Friday May 6th and plays through Sunday May 29th at Chicago House -- call 473-2542 for information.

Robert called attention to the Motorola T-shirt worn by Donna Delvy, and told us Motorola will give us \$500. Then with a rousing chorus of "Now to the banquet we press" off we went to the dining room.

- 1) On Monday February 28, 1994 at 6:30 pm in the O. Henry Room at the Austin History Center the newly elected Executive Committee held its first meeting. All were present except Theresa Wilson and Reba Gillman, secretary. No one took the minutes, and there is no report.
- 2) On Tuesday March 29, 1994 the Executive Committee met at 7 pm in the University Federal Credit Union. All officers were present, plus Bob Kusnetz, former Executive Vice President, and now member of the new Advisory Board.
- We need to record, document and list on grant applications all in-kind services received.
- We voted to donate \$200 to Capitol City Playhouse; in return we will receive listings in their programs.
- Operational procedures were discussed. Patrick Bennett would like to put together a production manual.
- Bill Hatcher will pursue the subject of small G&S concerts in the schools, and find out what we can do to support music education in the schools, especially at the lower grades.
- Terri Wilson and Diana McAlpin will work as a committee to develop criteria for qualifications and investigate the process of setting up scholarships for singing lessons for worthy young G&S performers.
- Allen Lawshae and Terri Wilson will serve as the committee to work on planning a Texas Gilbert & Sullivan Convention in Austin.
- We discussed hiring part-time clerical help and concluded that first we needed to find a small office space. Diana McAlpin and Patrick Bennett will make inquiries.
- The Austin Public Library has approached us about providing some short G&S musical programs for their Summer Reading Program for Children, June 6 July 31.
- We have been invited to provide a 20-30 minute program for the Jane Austen Society picnic in Northwest Park on Sunday afternoon, June 12.
- The next Exec. Com. meeting will be on Tuesday, April 26 at 6:30 pm, Austin History Center, O. Henry Room.
