• Message from your President •

I made a run for the border last week. In Laredo I attended the wedding of my friend Jose Greco II, the famous flamenco dancer, to his lovely bride Christina. It took place in a beautiful 1755 church. The next day I crossed the frontier and drove half way to Monterrey. I find that distance and time, space and environment, help put many things in sharper focus. For me it's necessary, and refreshing. Naturally, I had an opportunity to think about our Gondoliers.

John Bustin, Austin's dean of entertainment reviewers, wrote that our *Gondoliers* was "perhaps the best local G&S show to date." And I'm happy to report that we actually came out in the black. Mind you, we will not have made a "profit" as such, but we will not have entered the debit side of the ledger. I must confess that I had had my doubts about this. *The Gondoliers* was certainly the most expensive production that I have dealt with, and yet our corporate funding was down. What made the difference was the generous financial contributions of individuals, both old members of our G&S Society, and new. It proves that they must appreciate what we're doing.

And what a very impressive group of people our patrons are. They obviously must like theater and good music. But I suspect it's the uniquely intelligent comedy in the words and ideas of W. S. Gilbert, enhanced by Sullivan's catchy musical settings, that captures their minds as well as their hearts. Last Meeting and Musicale Monday, April 3, 1995

40 people gathered at Pearl Amster's. Members Pearl. Wren Andersen and mother Joy Sappington, Byron Arnason with daughter Sophia and her friend Dorothy Speyer, Frank & Donna Delvy, Reba Gillman, Loel Graber, Bill & Nan Hatcher with daughters Lauren & Lisa, Janette Jones, Matt Kaplan, his fiancé Alexa and his mother Nancy Owen, Allen Lawshae, Robert Mellin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Kay Novak, Virginia Storey, Jess & Emma Walters, Lord High Pianist Bob Wall, and Theresa Wilson; and welcome to Norma Garza, a former member who has rejoined; Gary Preuss, who has joined from the chorus of The Gondoliers; and Maurice Ommerman who sent in his dues later. Guests from The Gondoliers were Director Matthew Buchanan, Costume Coordinator Ellen Hughes; principals Mary Alice Carnes, Anna Derdeyn, and Marty Schwebel; and chorus members Arthur DiBianca, Glenna Gasser and Jonathan Slocum. Members underlined in the above list were also members of the cast. Principals Michael McKelvey and Michael Lucus had planned to be present but couldn't make it. Other guests were Greta Gutman, pianist, who came with Anna Derdeyn, and Freddy Carnes, Director for three of our Fund Raising Events, who came with Mary Alice.

Anna Derdeyn started things off singing "The Tipsy Waltz" from *La Perichole* by Offenbach, with Bob Wall at the piano. [See Editorial Note page 4.] President Robert made a few announcements. He welcomed Norma Garza back into the fold, and thanked new members for their generous contributions. [See full list elsewhere.] The show broke even financially, in part because of individual contributions. He offered *Gondoliers* posters and T-shirts still available for sale. And finally he produced a floral spray for Ellen Hughes, to make up for not having her on the list for the opening night bouquets handed out to cast and crew.

The evening's music was an orgy of refrains from Gondoliers, with Janette Jones and Frank Delvy leading off with their duet "To help unhappy commoners". Matt Kaplan sang his opening solo "For the merriest fellows are we" after announcing that he wished to make an Award to Loel Graber who was "the most active audience member we ever had." And indeed, Loel's appreciation of the show had been so vigorous that it made itself felt in the theater, and could be spotted from the stage. [Loel was reliving his own participation in our 1983 production of Gondoliers.]

Marty Schwebel sang "Take a pair of sparkling eyes", even though Topher, the drummer boy, wasn't there to listen to him. Allen Lawshae filled in for Don Alhambra (the part he played in 1983), and Loel for Luiz, so that Frank, Janette, and Mary Alice Carnes could sing the quintet

"Try we life-long". Robert introduced Mary Alice, our Casilda, and Freddy who told us about his exciting new job as the director of Create and Produce, a program in the schools provided by Austin Lyric Opera. Freddy works with the children to help them develop their own musical show, an experience which is expected to increase their appreciation of musical theater or opera.

Mary Alice then sang her two duets (in reverse order), "There was a time" with Matt Kaplan volunteering as her Luiz, and "O rapture, when alone together" with Director Matt Buchanan filling in for Luiz. Frank then sang "In enterprise of martial kind" with Janette, Mary Alice, and Matt B. singing the choruses. The versatile Matt B. continued to help out by singing Giuseppi to Marty's Marco in the rousing "We're called Gondolieri". They then launched into the finale of Act I, singing "Now pray, what is the cause of this remarkable hilarity," followed by "Replying, we sing As one individual" and continuing with "For ev'ryone who feels inclined, Some post we undertake to find, Congenial with his frame of mind - And all shall equal be" concluding with "O King! Whichever you may be," all sung with the enthusiastic choral help of the audience.

Time out then for introducing all the cast members present, with special thanks to Anna Derdeyn, whose mother helped sew costumes and whose son worked every performance back stage. Kay Novak remarked that the cast deserved special notice for singing the first weekend when half of them were sick, and never letting the audience know how ill they were. Frank said "Yes, Janette was in a coma the whole weekend." All joined in a rousing "Cachucha" to finish off the *Gondoliers* fest.

Asked to sing again, Anna responded saying she had no real songs in *Gondoliers*, so she would sing "Can't help lovin' that man of mine" from *Showboat*, accompanied by Greta Gutman. Frank told us that *Showboat* was his first musical. He had two lines: "I reckon" (said twice). He then sang The Nightmare Song from *Iolanthe*. It sounded perfect, even though Frank confessed he made a boo-boo. Jonathan Slocum volunteered to move us to our next production, and sang "I am a Pirate King" from *Pirates*, with all singing the chorus. Loel sang the opening and we all joined in with a full-throated "Hail Poetry", also from *Pirates*. Then with our traditional "Now to the banquet we press" (*Sorcerer*) we adjourned happily to munch and chat in Pearl's dining room. Thank you as always, Pearl, for your warm hospitality.

Editorial Note (from page 2): Anna probably didn't know it, but there is a historic connection between G&S and La Perichole. When Offenbach's operetta was about to open in London in 1875 the theater manager (none other than Richard D'Oyly Carte) was looking for a short afterwork to close the evening. He picked Gilbert's new play Trial By Jury for the spot, and suggested that Sullivan write the music. The result was a little masterpiece, which was so well received by London theater-goers that it overshadowed the Offenbach opera, and the G&S partnership was set for the many wonderful operas to follow.
