The Holiday Season All-Star Revue will feature great performers from Austin's theater and music scene, many of whom could not normally commit to a full length run. But they volunteered their talents for this Fund Raiser. And happily, Allen Lawshae has agreed to stage direct the show. In addition to being a long-time Society member, performer, and Board officer, his knowlege of Gilbert & Sullivan is hard to match. But the All-Star Revue is only the first act!

Direct from Dallas, the full cast of the Texas Gilbert & Sullivan Company, under the direction of Marian Shulman, will perform their *Trial By Jury*. This is the first time we will have brought a Gilbert & Sullivan group from out of town to perform for us. The performance will take place in a theater of special interest and importance. • Last Gathering and Musicale • Monday, October 9, 1995

32 people gathered at Pearl Amster's to enjoy a program featuring guests from the Austin Lyric Opera chorus. Members present were Pearl Amster, Byron Arnason, Advisory Board member "Deacon" Crain, Gina Ducloux, Harold Gilbert*, Reba Gillman, Bill Hatcher, Dan Jacobson, Allen Lawshae, Robert Mellin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Kay Novak, Maurie Ommerman, Bee Harris Polomé, Russ Prickett*, Dan Smith*, Lydia Storey, Lord High Pianist Bob Wall, Libby Weed, and Theresa Wilson, and G&S Office Manager Brenda Tharp. Guest performers from ALO included three of our members (marked with an *) and Anna Derdeyn, Marvin Frank, Mark White, and Joe C. White. Other performers were Pianist Greta Gutman, and Cynthia Hill (a pupil of Gina Ducloux's) - a lovely soprano new to Austin with her husband Marshall. Other guests were Annette Lezotte & John Mast, Andrée F, Sjoberg, and Jacob Williams also new to town, who has appeared in several G&S operas although he is still in High School. Member Chris Buggé joined us for the social part of the evening.

To start us off Harold Gilbert sang "A Policeman's lot is not a happy one" from *Pirates*, and Allen Lawshae sang "My name is John Wellington Wells" from *The Sorcerer*. President Robert Mellin welcomed us all and reminded us of the G&S Conference and Convention coming up on December 1, 2 and 3. Allen Lawshae will direct our All-Star Revue, and the Texas Gilbert & Sullivan Company will come down from Dallas to perform *Trial by Jury*. We welcome volunteers to help with the other activities.

Reba announced some events coming up including December performances of *The Beggar's Opera*, and the Russian comedy *Diary of a Scoundrel*, which will play at the Actor's Studio November 3 through December 2. Both member Sheila Glenn and former member Diana Sethre D'Emeraude are in that. Robert reported that he had seen a lively production of *Pirates* at McNeil High School; he announced the theme of our next Musicale: a sing through of *Pirates*. He invited anyone who wanted to sing a principal part to call the G&S office to leave his/her name, phone number, and the part to be sung.

Anna Derdeyn then took over to announce the ALO program. She welcomed Madame Ducloux as an integral part of ALO. Joe White sang "A more humane Mikado" from The Mikado, complete with blood curdling laugh. Dan Smith sang Coline's aria from Puccini's La Boheme, and Mark Long sang a plaintive "Willow, Tit-willow" from Mikado. Anna introduced the Austin Light Opera Ensemble: Marvin Frank and Russ Prickett sang "We're called Gondolieri" from The Gondoliers, Greta Gutman played the piano, and Anna turned pages. Russ and Marvin sang "Man of La Mancha" by Mitch Leigh and Joe Damion, with Greta at the piano and Anna producing an excellent rhythmic back up, sometimes assisted by the audience. Anna explained that every G&S opera has to have a resident mezzo soprano battle ax, and sang Dame Carruthers' grand and grim song "When the gallant Norman foes" from Yeomen of the Guard, with chorus supplied by Mark, Russ and Joe. On a lighter note the Ensemble finished up with Russ and Anna singing "Wunderbar" from Cole Porter's Kiss Me Kate. (Continued on p.4)

Note: I am embarrassed - Marty Schwebel played <u>Marco</u> in our *Gondoliers*. I got it wrong in the last Newsletter.


• Pirates of Penzance • Report by Robert Mellin
