

#### • Last Meeting and Musicale •

39 people gathered for G&S and other delights at Pearl Amster's on Monday March 3. Guests were Linalice Carey, who helped get our Society started in her Creek Theater back in 1976; Cynthia Hill, our alternate Mabel in Pirates; and Verna Grice with Winston Bode, journalist and old time Austinite, who has recently featured the Society on his five-minute KVET broadcast "On The Avenue" [Tune in to 1300 AM at 5 minutes before 1 pm any Monday through Friday to hear his program.]

Looking for a Lord High Ice Breaker to start the evening's events Robert seized on Frank Delvy, who obliged with perhaps the most famous of all the G&S songs, "Willow, tit-willow" (*Mikado*) with the irreplaceable Bob Wall at the piano.

Robert then told us that our next production *The* Yeomen of the Guard will run June 20 - 29 at the State Theater on Congress Avenue, with auditions the first weekend in April. Call the Society Office for details. [See page 1 of the Newsletter for the announcement.]

Cynthia Hill then raised her lovely voice singing "Getting to know you" from *The King and I* (Rodgers and Hammerstein) and "Oh! mio babbino caro" from *Gianni Schicchi* (Puccini). This was followed by a novelty for us, Frank accompanying himself on the guitar. He told us he first came to Austin in 1973, playing and singing in Doak Snead's band. He played in many different bands often at the old Armadillo World Headquarters, and only after 1981 did he move into acting in theaters. He was wearing the T-shirt from the last band he played in, "Dogs at Play." He sang "Mary Crawley" by Marty Robbins, and "Remember" by Doak Snead. Putting aside his guitar Frank sang "Fanette" from *Jacques Brel is Alive and Well* by Brel, accompanied by Bob Wall.

Then back to G&S with Russell Gregory singing "Oh, better far to live and die a Pirate King" from *Pirates*, with all joining in on the choruses. We were especially glad to welcome back Russell, who had been laid up for several months with a bloodclot in his leg. After that Wren Andersen played her guitar and sang an old Bee Gees song "I

started a joke, but I didn't see the joke was on me", followed by "Don't cry for me, Argentina" from *Evita* (Lloyd-Webber).

Allen Lawshae brought us back to G&S momentarily, singing "There lived a king" (Gondoliers) and "When the night wind howls" (Ruddigore) with lusty choruses from the audience. Then Russell accompanied himself in "Every day is ladies day for me" by Victor Herbert, and Frank sang "Where is the life that late I led?" from Kiss me Kate by Cole Porter. Robert appeared laden with baguettes from Texas French Bread, which he proceeded to award to random persons who were able to answer such difficult questions as "What's your name?" mixed in with Gilbert and Sullivan trivia questions. (as "What was Gilbert's middle name?") Cynthia Hill sang "The hills are alive with the sound of music" from The Sound of Music (Rodgers and Hammerstein), and Frank sang The Nightmare Song from Iolanthe. With a rousing "Now to the banquet we press" (Sorcerer) we pressed on to Pearl's dining room for conversation and refreshments.

#### The Yeomen of the Guard

This is Gilbert and Sullivan's most nearly tragic opera. Colonel Fairfax, falsely accused of sorcery, is to be beheaded in the Tower of London. To thwart his accuser he secretly marries Elsie Maynard, while both are blindfolded. Sergeant Meryll and his daughter Phoebe (who is in love with Fairfax) help him escape from the Tower. Fairfax discovers that Elsie is his bride and woos her, in his disguise as a Yeoman of the Guard. When the Merylls' help is discovered both are forced into unwanted marriages. This is also the story of Jack Point, the itinerant jester travelling with Elsie, whom he intended to marry. When a pardon arrives for Fairfax all is revealed. Elsie chooses Fairfax and Jack Point, crushed, falls senseless at their feet. Although not often performed, this opera has some of Sullivan's best music and some of Gilbert's most poignant observations on life.


