On Monday May 5, 1997 at 7:30 pm, 38 people gathered at Pearl's. Smith, Bernadette Tasher, Jess & Emma Walters, Libby Weed, Ernie Welch, and Theresa Wilson. Guests were Winston Bode, Anna Derdeyn, Pam Jaroschy with Gui and Catherine, Cary Michaels, and a newcomer whose name is not certain - it looks like Kelley Kulchisty (Welcome! and my apologies if that's not right).

Robert Mellin, our Executive Director, called for an attention getter, and Frank Delvy stepped up to sing "The law is the true embodiment of everything that's excellent" from Iolanthe with Lord High Substitute Marilyn Babcock accompanying (make that Lady High Substitute). Robert followed with some announcements. 1) Our In-School Concerts are a great success. The teachers like them, the administrators like them, and the kids love them. We're lucky to have identified two worthy students to receive a scholarship: Gui and Catherine Jaroschy, the children of our good friend, the late Michel Jaroschy." Gui attends St. Stephen's School, and plays the trumpet. Catherine is graduating from Travis High School and has received a scholarship to attend St. Edward's University. She is a piano student of Pearl Amster's, and will play something for us later. Robert then presented a check for \$500, while Lord High Photographer Ernie Welch snapped away.

Back to music, with Loel Graber joining Frank to sing "Kind Captain, I've important information" from *Pinafore*. Next Anna Derdeyn, who will play the part of Dame Carruthers in our production of *Yeomen*, sang the stirring "When our gallant Norman foes" with strong men's chorus from the audience. Cary returned to sing "Stranger in Paradise" from *Kismet*, words and music by Robert Wright and George Forrest, after melodies composed by Borodin. Frank, complete with jester's cap and bells, sang "A private buffoon is a light-hearted loon" from *Yeomen*. Our President Libby Weed rose to ask "Did you all read your newsletter in its new form? Didn't it look nice? And did you notice the announcement about the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival in Philadelphia July 18 - 27? We really want to encourage members to attend. If you're interested, please call me or Robert or Reba." Message From Your President

You've read about the in-school musical programs that are a vital part of our mission of education. I've been a part of board meetings where the concerts were planned. But last month I finally was a member of the audience for a school concert, and what a delight it was!

Amy Stinson, Janette Jones, Dan Girardot, Robert Mellin, and Bob Wall arrived at Brentwood Christian School, where I serve as principal, wearing *G&S* T-shirts and blending in rather well with our crowd. Over 300 students from second grade through high school spread over the floor of our gym, not at all sure what kind of program awaited them. But before the thirty-minute concert had ended, they were clapping, shouting, and pumping their arms in delight at the incredible vocals, down-in-the-audience acting, and first-class entertainment that had been brought their way.

"Thank you sooo much for coming to our school and performing," wrote Alison, a sixth grader. "My favorite part was when the old maid wanted the young man to marry her. I really hope that some day I can do something like that." (I think she means sing and act -- not be an old maid pursuing a young man!)

"I loved the performance. It was amazingly inspiring." said seventh-grader Suneethia. "The soprano has the highest voice I have ever heard!... I hope you will come to BCS several more times."

"We liked the part about the pirate king and the young man whose birthday was on Leap Year," wrote Miss

Stokes' third grade class. "Thank you very much for coming to our school."

And high school sophomore Yahna wrote, "It was absolutely amazing! I would give anything to be able to sing like that."

Each student who wrote is a part of either a daily music class or a performing choir at the school. On that April day, most of them heard a kind of music outside the realm of their daily life, and yet it is clear from their letters that they appreciated what they heard. Who knows whether a Yahna or an Alison might be one of our auditioners in a few years? And who knows whether that thirty minutes in the gym might have awakened a desire in several little hearts to know more about goood music?

It is exciting to think about this happening all over the city. . . . at Covington, Govalle, Johnston High, and Brooke. Young people who have never heard such music are introduced to something that can bring sweetness and grace to their lives and open new worlds of learning and enjoyment. Senior choir member Mike, an all-state tenor, said for them all, "On behalf of the students, I thank you for your performance."

This is one of those things that should make you feel very good about being a part of the Gilbert & Sullivan Society of Austin.

Plan now to join us at Pearl's for our musicale on September 8. Robert is putting together a great program.
