# LAST MEETING AND MUSICALE

On Monday Sept. 8, 1997, we opened the season with 39 G&S enthusiasts in attendance at Pearl Amster's. Members Pearl Amster, Byron Arnason, Lucian Chimene, Deacon Crain, Frank Delvy, Reba Gillman, Loel Graber, Enid Hallock & son Gary, Bill Hatcher & daughter Lauren, Janette Jones, John Mast, Nancy McQueen, Robert Mellin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Bee Harris Polome & Chuck Kraus, Larry Shepley, Andree Sjoberg, Dan Smith, Leland L. Smith, Lord High Pianist Bob Wall, Jess & Emma Walters, Libby Weed, Lord High Photographer Ernie Welch, and Theresa Wilson attended. Several new members also joined us: Stuart Inglis, Glenn A. Breed, Robert Dole, Cynthia Hill, Teresa Kim, Mark Long, Melissa Raymond, and Mark Shannon. Three guests also participated: Jeanette Lay and Martha & Barry Williams.

President Libby Weed welcomed us to another happy year of Gilbert & Sullivan. She introduced Executive Director Robert Mellin, who took over the proceedings. He announced that our big production this season will be *The Mikado* playing in June at the Helm Fine Arts Center at St. Stephens. It will be a wonderful, authentic production.

Robert told us that a lot of the Yeomen cast were with us tonight, ready and eager to sing music from the show. To open, Robert Dole, Mark Long, Mark Shannon, Dan Smith, Melissa Raymond, and Teresa Kim, a lusty six-person chorus, sang "Here's a man of jollity," with Frank Delvy and Cynthia Hill entering as Jack Point and Elsie Maynard, and continuing with their duet, "I have a song to sing, O!" Janette Jones, as Phoebe, then sang the song that opens the opera, "When maiden loves, she sits and sighs." Enid Hallock was prevailed upon to sing the dramatic but difficult "When the gallant Norman foes," Dame Carruthers' bloodthirsty recital, with the chorus joining in on the ominous refrain "The screw may twist and the rack may turn, And men may bleed and men may burn, O'er London town and its golden hoard I keep my silent watch and ward!"

Continuing to sample here and there, we skipped ahead to the second act and Frank sang "Oh! a private buffoon is a lighthearted loon," with all five verses by popular demand — several were omitted from our pro-

duction. Then back to the first act, with Cynthia Hill, our charming Elsie, singing "Tis done! I am a bride!" Robert declared this won the Bread Prize and produced a loaf donated by Texas French Bread — more was distributed later. With a flourish, Robert brought forth a *Yeomen* T-shirt and a video tape of our *Pirates*, both available for sale. Scrolling past while the orchestra plays the overture, all the members' names appear on the opening display of the video. The chorus sang the somber opening to Act II, "Night has spread her pall once more," with Enid again providing Dame Carruther's solo "Warders are ye? Whom do ye ward?"

The new members then introduced themselves, all having sung in our *Yeomen*. Dan Smith said he had appeared in our last five productions. As for Frank, he's sung in eight, starting back in 1983 with our first production of *Gondoliers*. Janette has also appeared in eight of our shows, starting in 1988 I believe.

Back to Act I, the chorus sang "The pris'ner comes to meet his doom;" with Cynthia supplying Elsie's solo. Janette sang "Were I thy bride," in which Phoebe steals the jailer's keys, and then returns them unnoticed.


Mike Shannon volunteered to sing the part of Shadbolt to Frank's Jack Point in the song "Hereupon were both agreed ... What a tale of cock and bull!" from Act II. Frank undertook to sing the tenor part, joined by Cynthia and Janette, in "A man who would woo a fair maid." And to wind it all up, Elsie

(Cynthia) sang "A suppliant at thy feet I fall." The chorus joined in, and Frank sang "Oh, thoughtless crew! Ye know not what ye do!" to introduce the very last song of the opera, "I have a song to song, O!"

Looking forward to our next show Frank and Enid sang 'There is beauty in the bellow of the blast" from *The Mikado*. Lucian Chimene reminded us that the Mikado had decreed "That all who flirted, leered, or winked (Unless connubially linked), Should forthwith he beheaded." Now, a town in Oregon has passed a law making it a crime to wink. Lucian said, "It's only a matter of time before Gilbert's ability to foresee the future will be fully evident."

Robert gave us a brief report on his attendance at the International Gilbert & Sullivan Festival in Philadelphia in July. He said he saw the rarely produced operas, *Princess Ida*, and *Utopia Limited* as well as two versions of *Cox and Box* and all the familiar operas. Asked if he thought we might put on one of the less well-known operas, he replied that *Princess Ida* might well be done here.

Then standing, we all sang "Hail Poetry!" from *Pirates*, and "Now to the banquet we press" from *The Sorcerer*. We gave a rousing thank you to our faithful pianist, Bob Wall. Welcome back, Bob! Then, we went off the chat and munch in Pearl's dining room. And through it all, Ernie Welch was taking the pictures we love, some of which are printed in this newsletter. Thank you Ernie!

# THE ROLE OF D'OYLY CARTE

DIANA BELL

The man who was to forge the talents of these two disparate personalities into a creative sword that cut through the banality and parochialism of native English light opera, was christened Richard Doyle McCarthy and was born in Greek Street, Soho, On 3 May 1844. His father was a flautist who owned an instrument making company, Rudall, Rose and Co., which later became the famous firm of Rudall Care and was the first to import the saxophone into London. Richard invented a "new" flute, which is now in the Victoria and Albert Museum. Like Sullivan, he had Irish blood, and had a woodwind player for a father; indeed the two men became devoted friends. His mother, Eliza Jones, was the daughter of a cultivated and literary clergyman. She claimed French descent and made Richard speak French for two days a week at home. He was the eldest of six children and the whole family were creatively orientated: he mounted plays in a model theatre, which were so impressively atmospheric that a younger sister is reported to have burst into tears and vowed never to watch another production by her brother.

Carte went to University College School from 1856 to 1860, and, like Gilbert, proceeded to London University, but did not take his degree, deciding instead, after a year, to go into his father's business. By 1870, he had set himself up as a concert agent in Charing Cross Road with singers, dramatists and lecturers on his books, including the great Adelina Patti, the poet Matthew Arnold and Oscar Wilde. But he had always wanted to be an impresario, and became manager of the Royal Theatre, Soho, which specialized in operas and burlesques. Now, he was poised to fulfil his 1869 ambition, when he had stated that his life's aim was to establish "English comic opera in a theatre devoted to that alone."

His childhood creativity continued into adult life and he wrote several operettas, under the nom-de-plume Mark Lynne. He produced the first, *Dr. Ambrosias*, when only 24. It was reasonably successful. *Marie* followed at the Opera Comique in 1871, the same year as *Thespis*, and his last work at the Royalty in 1877 was called *Happy Hampstead*. By 1871 he was married to Blanche Prowse, whose father was one of the founders of Keith Prowse, but she died ten years later, leaving him with two sons, Lucas, who became a barrister, and Rupert, born in 1876, who was to succeed his father in the management of his opera company.

Reba has been a guiding light of the Gilbert & Sullivan Society of Austin since 1978. For a total of eighteen years she has served as our secretary and editor of our newsletter. During the period from 1981 to 1983, she was our president. Her lovely soprano voice was featured in productions between 1978 and 1985: *Iolanthe, Patience*,

Scenes (from various operas), *Trial by Jury*, *Gondoliers*, and *Ruddigore*.

Reba and her husband, Dr. Leonard Gillman, professor emeritus, UT department of mathematics, have both provided leadership and support to the Society. Last April, Len delighted the group gathered at Pearl Amster's with Tom Lehrer's "The Elements." After singing Tom's catalog of the 102 elements that had been discovered at the time the song was written, Len added a coda he wrote when the list had reached 109, adding "hahnium, lawrencium, and also rutherfordium, and 106-7-8 and 9. No more yet, thank the Lordium!" Len, we're still

waiting for your next verse, bringing the song up to date with all the elements since discovered! Reba and Len are surely one of the most interesting couples in Austin — as they probably were when they were in Rochester, Princeton, Lafayette (Indiana), and Washington, D.C. before coming here. Last December they threw a combined birthday and anniversary bash to commemorate their natal days and their marriage.

Please come on Oct. 6 to find our more fascinating things about Reba and to share us in thanking her for her many contributions to our Society. Reba, we couldn't have done what we have done without you!
