Last Musicale

On Monday, May 3, 1999 we gathered at Paula Tyler's house to hear cast members from *Patience* sing some of the highlights and explain the story. Present were MEMBERS Lucian Chimene, Doug & Yvonne Vautier DeLay, Frank & Donna Delvy, Arthur DiBianca, Wyndy & Edgar Ellis, Reba & Len Gillman, Loel Graber, Bill Hatcher, Cynthia Hill, Janette Jones, Norman & Emilia Martin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Bee Harris Polomé & Chuck Krauss, Steve & Eve Schwartzman, Larry Shepley, Leland L. Smith, Rose Taylor & Russ Prickett, Paula Tyler, Lord High Pianist Bob Wall, Libby Weed, and Theresa Wilson, and GUEST James Hampton, who sings the part of Grosvenor — a total of 30 people.

Libby welcomed us, thanked Paula for her gracious hospitality, and asked if anyone had been listening to KMFA that afternoon. Thanks to Arthur DiBianca's suggestion, we had provided Rich Upton (KMFA afternoon program) with a *Mikado* CD to play on the air, and ten copies of the CD to give away to listeners who could answer trivia questions like, "What were the first names of Gilbert and Sullivan?" Upton mentioned our production of Patience and gave the performance dates at the Helm Fine Arts Center at St. Stephen's. He will do this on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoons, which will be good publicity for our show. Libby then turned things over to Frank Delvy, the emcee for the program.

Frank began by telling us of the very successful in-school performance at Sanchez Elementary School last week. With Bob Wall accompanying, Frank, Dan Girardot, Amy Stinson, and Janette Jones sang excerpts mainly from *Pirates*, for the very enthusiastic third and fourth graders, who also learned "They sail the ocean blue" from *Pinafore*. Fifth and Sixth graders also attended, but Frank said they were more self-conscious.

To introduce the evening's program Frank told us that in 1881 the production of *Patience* moved into the new Savoy Theatre, built by D'Oyly Carte especially to house the Gilbert and Sullivan operas, and equipped with the latest technical effects. Patience thus became the first theatrical production in England to be electrically lighted. He also told us that although the opera was written to satirize the æsthetic movement, which was sweeping England, the character of Bunthorne was not modeled on any one æsthete, but drew from Whistler and Swinburne and others.

Since the chorus was not present the twenty lovesick maidens and the dashingly military dragoon guards would not be represented tonight. Instead Frank as Bunthorne, and Cynthia Hill as Patience, opened the scene with some of the clever dialog, followed by Bunthorne's song confessing "I am an æsthetic sham!" Then pressing Janette Jones into service as "Lady Angela du jour," Lord High Substitute for all missing female parts, Janette and Cynthia gave us the ensuing dialog and led into the charming duet "Long years ago, fourteen maybe." As Patience pondered her ignorance of love, the ennobling and unselfish passion, and vowed to fall in love at once — with a stranger — in came Grosvenor, an idyllic poet, played by James Hampton. Together they sang "Prithee, pretty maiden". It turned out that Grosvenor was the lovely baby Patience had played with years ago, but their happiness at finding each other was rudely ended

by Patience, who said that since love had to be unselfish she could not love the perfect Grosvenor.

On to Act II, with Rose Taylor as Lady Jane singing "Sad is that woman's lot." She alone has remained faithful to Bunthorne, but all the other lovesick maidens are now flocking around the new poet Grosvenor (James Hampton). He enters and recites a poem at the maidens' request, "Gentle Jane was as good as gold, She always did as she was told" Then to illustrate how hopeless it is to love him he sings "A magnet hung in a hardware shop." Following this Patience confesses to Grosvenor that although she loves Bunthorne because it is her duty, she is miserable with him. Then to convince Bunthorne that she knows what love is, she sings "Love is a plaintive song, Sung by a suff'ring maid, Telling a tale of wrong, Telling of hope betrayed." Patience leaves weeping and Bunthorne returns, followed by Lady Jane (who apparently never lets him out of her sight). She offers to help him and they sing a snappy duet about what Bunthorne should say to his rival Grosvenor, "So go to him and say to him." The result is that Bunthorne threatens Grosvenor with a curse if he does not change completely and become absolutely commonplace. Grosvenor yields cheerfully; at last he has a reasonable pretext for such a change: "I do it on compulsion!" and they sing the duet "When I go out of door." At this point Frank said "We'll leave before the end. We won't give it away, so you'll come see the show."

Frank then said that since we had in the room the only two living Lord Chancellors (*Iolanthe*) in Austin they should sing the Nightmare Song together. Len Gillman came forward, and off they went, singing "When you're lying awake with a dismal headache, and repose is taboo'd by anxiety," at a very good clip. After that Loel Graber sang the Pirate King's introduction, and we all rose to sing "Hail Poetry" (*Pirates*), followed by "Now to the banquet we press" (*Sorcerer*). Chairs were quickly folded or moved back, the food beckoned, and a good time was had by all.

More News of Rafe MacPhail

For several summers our favorite director and G&S authority has been conducting Elderhostels, in Connecticut, on his favorite subject, and this year is no exception. The two programs are held at the Incarnation Center, Ivoryton, CT. Rafe will share the responsibility with Deborah Lyon, a musical stalwart of the Connecticut G&S Society. The first session, July 11-17, will feature lectures, readings, group singing, and video and audio recordings, and will conclude, for those inclined to perform, with a concert version of Iolanthe. The following session, July 18-24, will concentrate on The Big Three — Pinafore, Pirates, and Mikado — with less emphasis on performance, though there will be a last-night concert (again, by those so inclined). Those familiar with Elderhostel will know that tuition (\$397 for each session) includes room and board (Sunday dinner to Saturday breakfast), and that eligibility begins at age 55 (a younger spouse or adult companion may attend with an age-eligible participant).
