Last Musicale

A group of 31 people were happy to meet again at Pearl Amster's on Monday October 4, 1999, to enjoy a delightful program planned by Frank Delvy. Present were members Stacey Amorous, Pearl Amster, Byron Arnason, Lucian Chimene, Doug & Yvonne Vautier DeLay, Frank & Donna Delvy, Wyndy & Edgar Ellis, Reba Gillman, Cynthia Hill, Janette Jones, John Mast, Nancy McQueen, Robert Mellin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Maurie Ommerman, Bee Harris Polomé & Chuck Kraus, Steve & Eve Schwartzman, Bob Sharron, Larry Shepley, David Tampke, Nell Leavell Trimble, Lord High Pianist Bob Wall, Libby Weed, and Theresa Wilson, and guest performers Jennifer Arndt and Andrew Coward.

President Libby welcomed us all, and began the evening with three announcements, listed separately elsewhere in this Newsletter. Reba said she had some *Patience* videos with her. Bee Polomé urged us to attend the Austin Civic Orchestra's first concert of the season on October 23rd. And Robert Mellin invited all friends of Michel Jaroschy to come to the Memorial on October llth at the former Capitol City Playhouse (now the Fadó Irish Pub). Libby then turned the evening over to Frank, who said "It's October so I'll sing the only Halloween music in Gilbert and Sullivan." Lord High Pianist Bob Wall set the stage with the sinister accompaniment, and Frank launched into "When the night wind howls" from *Ruddigore*.

Libby told us that despite the many reasons that people preferred a fund raiser in February, rather than the busy month of December, the Board had weighed all the pros and cons, and decided to go ahead with a December Fund Raiser. Frank has agreed to direct it. He said that the theme would be "Forward to the Past," and that he was gathering as many principal players from our productions as he could, from people like Russell Gregory to Rose Taylor. They would sing excerpts from their roles, and slides would be projected from the original scenes, complete with costumes.

Frank noted that in 1990 we did *Patience* at Hyde Park Theater, and this year finished off the decade performing *Patience* last June at St. Stephen's. This served to introduce a scene from *Patience*, starting with the dialog between Bunthorne and Patience played by Frank and Cynthia Hill. Then Stacy Amorous came on as Lady Angela and joined Cynthia in the duet, "Long years ago."

Next Frank introduced the quartet he sings with, "A Class Act," with singers Jennifer Arndt, Janette Jones, Andrew Coward, and Frank. They go into the schools to perform for the children, but they will be doing some performances that are open to the public: a fund raiser for Freddy Carnes's Children of Light Players on Sunday October 17th at The Dougherty Arts Center. And on Saturday, November 6th (which just happens to be Frank's birthday), they will perform at 7:30 pm at the Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church on Bee Caves Road.

They sang "Only you have the power to move me," from Starlight Express by Andrew Lloyd Webber. Janette sang "I dreamed a dream in days gone by" from Les Miserables. Tenor

Andrew Coward sang from the show *Chess* about an international chess match during the cold war, an anthem telling of the Russian contender's love for his homeland.

Cynthia brought us back to G&S with Elsie's poignant "Tis done, I am a bride," from *The Yeomen of the Guard*. Then back to "A Class Act" singing, as two couples, "Love changes everything" by Andrew Lloyd Webber. Frank jogged our memories with a reprise of his role in *South Pacific* at Capitol City Playhouse, singing "One dream in my heart." Donna, Pearl, and Reba remembered that show well. Stacey Amorous sang us a clever and peppy number, "The Crossword Puzzle Song" from *Starting Here*, *Starting Now*, a musical review that Stacey said had many good tunes, but just didn't make the big time.

As a preview of what's coming in June 2000, Frank and Janette sang "Things are seldom what they seem," from *H.M.S. Pinafore*. But then in a complete departure, Frank sang the first song he had had a record of as a kid, "High Noon" from the movie by that name, written by Dimitri Tiomkin and Ned Washington. Singing more of this team's work, Frank thoroughly enjoyed himself with "Rawhide," and "The gunfight at OK Corral." And of course, if Frank was having fun, so was the audience. He said he had had a good time putting the program together, and thanked all the performers.

Finally, to thank Lucy Meritt for putting up with all the non-G&S songs, Frank sang her favorite "Rising early in the moming," from *The Gondoliers*. It's another one of Gilbert's fast paced tongue twisters, and Frank just tossed it off. Andrew and Frank led us with the Priate King's introduction, and we all rose to sing "Hail Poetry" (*Pirates*), and "Now to the banquet we press" (*Sorcerer*). Thereafter the happy throng gathered in the dining room to sample the goodies and chat. Thank you Pearl, for your hospitality!

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
