Message from Your President

I recently gave a talk at LAMP (Learning Activities for Mature People, a UTAustin-sponsored lecture group, of which I am a member) on "The H.M.S. Pinafore Craze". Of course, I mixed in a bit of physics and technology: For example, Samuel Morse is known to have invented the telegraph in the mid-1840s, and yet in the 1820s there were many newspapers with "telegraph" in their names (such as "The Daily Telegraph"). Actually, what Morse had invented was the electric telegraph; the word itself had previously been used to designate a system of semaphore signalling devices. Similarly, Alexander Graham Bell supposedly invented the telephone, first demonstrating it to a wide audience at the centennial exhibit in Philadelphia in 1876, but the word "telephone" had been applied to a system of transmitting signals by musical tones. Anyway, by 1878, just two years after Bell's exhibition, towns all over the U.S. and Britain had started installing telephone systems, and so Gilbert included a reference in Pinafore: As Ralph is led away to the dungeon, the chorus sympathizes,

He'll hear no tone
Of the maiden he loves so well!
No telephone
Comunicates with his cell!

Now why did I bring up the telegraph? It was because Bell really was trying to improve the telegraph when he invented his telephone. And the Western Union Telegraph company thought so little of Bell's invention that they rewarded he by making him the ruler of his own companee — in other words, they turned him down, forcing him to go out on his own, a business decision widely accepted as one of the most short-sighted ever.

This upcoming Musicale will be in part a look forward to our own production of *Pinafore* (get your tickets early and often — we expect this to be a popular show). And we will have more. Pooh-Bah sneered at "young persons" (in his eyes they occupied a rank below that of Stockbroker), but we reach out to them. Some of these young persons, from Doss Elementary School, will be performing and will join us in the social hour afterwards. I hope you will be there, too.
