I have lots to say:

#### Musicales

I have now organized several Musicales, and it's fun. If you would like to organize one, please let us know. I and the rest of the Board will welcome you and give you all the help you want. My personal preference when organizing the entertainment is to plan on involving the audience as much as possible and to experiment a bit. For example, I wanted to concentrate on *Princess Ida* at our last get together, and I thought it would be interesting to download music from the G&S web archive — readily available — for both chorus and solo numbers. That home-grown *karaoke* worked to some extent (and so I wasn't all that upset when our pianist couldn't make it at the last minute), though a real, live piano player is better, I will agree. You, too, can experiment, be creative, and have fun: Organize a Musicale!

#### Pirates in School

We need contacts. **Jean Smootz** has sent out lots of letters to elementary school principals. ### Last Musicale

On Monday October 1, 2001, we gathered at Paula Tyler's house for the monthly Musicale, advertised as "Everything you always wanted to know about *Princess Ida*."

Present were 39 members: Christine & Rick Alan, Jean Buggé, Sue Caldwell, Lucian Chimene, Arthur DiBianca, Len & Reba Gillman, John & Carolyn Gregory, Sandra Grimes, Enid Hallock, Gary Hallock, Bill Hatcher, Jim & Patrice Hunter, Holton Johnson, Janette Jones, Allen Lawshae & JoAnn Reeves, Robert Mellin, Lucy Shoe Meritt, Maurie Ommerman (thanks for taking pictures), Barbara (Bee) Harris Polomé, Russell Prickett, Martha Schumacher & Errol Olson, Larry Shepley, Andree Sjoberg, Leland L. Smith, Derek Smootz, Ed & Jean Smootz, Paula Tyler, Sofia Voloch & Jane Ross, Libby Weed, Dave Wieckowski, and Theresa (Terri) Wilson.

President Larry Shepley opened the meeting by calling on Reba Gillman. She announced that the Jess Walters Tribute would take place on Tuesday, November 20 at the One World Theatre, and would be entirely planned and performed by Jess's son, Emil Wolk. More information, including the time, will be announced when it becomes available. [This date has now been changed to Sunday November 18th, which is Jess's birthday.]

Larry thanked volunteers Arthur DiBianca and Jean and Derek Smootz for their hard work in the Society office. He also wished Derek a happy birthday on October 6th.

Proceeding to the main subject of the evening Larry stated that *Princess Ida* first appeared in 1884, right after *Iolanthe*. He asked how many of us had ever seen *Princess Ida*. A few had, and most of those had actually performed in it. There was speculation on why the opera was so seldom performed. Allen Lawshae said he had found it very boring, although things picked up in the last act. He thought the main problem was the subject. Larry said that the opera was three acts long, and written in iambic pentameter; also the subject was hopelessly out of place today (making fun of women who aspire to an education) but said he liked it anyway. Janette Jones who had performed in the opera in New York City, where she sang with the Light Opera of Manhattan, defended *Princess Ida*, saying it contained some of the best music, and that it made fun of men, too.

Larry briefly outlined the plot and asked for volunteers to read some dialog later on. He also informed us that unfortunately our pianist, Leslie Salas, would not be present, so he would have to use some accompaniments he had recorded from the G&S Archives on the Internet, supplemented by live flute music, played by himself or Bill Hatcher. With this accompaniment Holton Johnson sang Hilarion's song "Ida was a twelvemonth old, Twenty years ago!" and Art DiBianca sang King Gama's song "If you give me your attention, I will tell you what I am." Then Larry said "Those of you who are old enough remember Tom Lehrer, and if you're even older you remember Len Gillman, Reba's husband."

Len came forward and read all three verses of "The Professor's Song," by Tom Lehrer (to the tune of King Gama's song, just performed by Art). It starts:

"If you give me your attention I will tell you what I am. I'm a brilliant math' matician — also something of a ham. I have tried for numerous degrees, in fact I've one of each; Of course that makes me eminently qualified to teach."

Len then gave us a little background on Tom Lehrer whom he met back in the '60's. Tom is now 73 years old; he studied Math and Statistics at Harvard, where he got a Master's degree. He began performing his clever songs at parties while he was a graduate student, and later did many more public performances and recordings. For many years he has spent half the year in Cambridge, MA, and the other half teaching at the University of California at Santa Cruz. Len then proceeded to sing the first verse of the Major General's song from Pirates, coming to the words "I'm very well acquainted too with matters mathematical, I understand equations, both the simple and quadratical, About binomial theorem I'm teaming with a lot of news — With many cheerful facts about the square of the hypotenuse." And at last "I'm very good at integral and differential calculus" upon which he stopped and looked at the audience with a twinkle in his eye and said, "By the way, I really am." He held up a heavy tome entitled Calculus which he had written with one of his PhD students, Robert McDowell.

Len then embarked on the performance of a few of Tom Lehrer's well-known songs; "I hold your hand in mine, dear," "The Irish Ballad," (which brought forth from members of the audience a full chorus of many verses), and "Oedipus Rex." Len finished with his usual rapid-fire rendition of "The Elements" and passed out copies of the words. Later, over munchies, our 10-year-old member, Sofia Voloch, said "He didn't do 'Poisoning Pigeons in the Park.' That's my favorite."

We then continued with *Princess Ida*, singing the female chorus "Death to the invader," followed by women's dialog spoken by Sue Caldwell, Enid Hallock, Janette Jones, Libby Weed, and Terri Wilson, in which Princess Ida finds that none of her lady students are up to a battle with the men. Then we sang the finale "With joy abiding." There followed some dialog for the men, spoken by Lucian Chimene, Gary Hallock, Bill Hatcher, Allen Lawshae, and Derek Smootz. Enid sang "A lady fair, of lineage high," with men's chorus from Allen, Bill, and Gary. At last we all sang Cyril's song "Would you know the kind of maid Sets my heart a-flame-a?"

Larry told us that he had been reading a book by Ian Taylor on how to produce concert versions of operas. He said he wanted to put on "A Night at the Operetta" (title by Jean Smootz), an informal presentation of *Princess Ida*, at our Musicale on Monday March 4. This would be right after the auditions for *Pirates*, and Rafe MacPhail would be in town. Excerpts from each act would be presented, perhaps by different casts. This would require people who could learn the music and words. There should be a narrator, and some acting, with one person in charge of each group. There should be a stage manager and costumes (even if skimpy — Libby said "Sheets will work!"), and a wardrobe manager. For venue Larry said he would try to book us in the big room at the Armstrong Community Music School, or Dougherty Arts Center.

Finally Carolyn Gregory was pressed into service to accompany us in our customary final flourishes: "Hail Poetry" (Russell Prickett sang the Pirate King's introduction), and "Now to the banquet we press," and all gathered to enjoy the munchies and good fellowship.


