One of the privileges of being President is taking credit for good things that happen whether I had anything to do with them or not (such as the sun rising). *Princess Ida*, however, as a doit-yourself opera, was my idea originally (Leland Smith had been pushing us to do it as a full-fledged version for some time), but of course the directors, Art DiBianca, Gary Hallock, and Brad Merrell, with Derek Smootz, really deserve most of the credit. In any case, it was a rousing success, and do-it-yourself programs should be repeated. Barbara Lee of Westminster Manor was most helpful, both in arranging for Harris Bell Hall and during the performance. I'd call it a sell-out, but we didn't charge admission; in any case, it was standing room only!

In the future, I propose that we charge a small admission fee (but not to members!). There are costs involved, but mainly there is work. It's such fun, though, that I think we'll have lots of volunteers to do future shows. Jeanne Stillman did a great job on piano, and thanks, too, to Lynda Oswalt, Dona Brooks, and Leslie Salas (who sang Princess Ida) for their help as rehearsal accompanists. Rehearsals were at the home of Chris & Gary Hallock, and Anita Krampitz was an important consultant. In other news, the Board firmed up our dates for this summer's major production. It will be *Trial by Jury*, preceded by little-known scenes from Gilbert & Sullivan, or Gilbert or Sullivan without the other. The grand opening will be Friday June 14, with shows for that one weekend only. We will be playing at the Helm Fine Arts Center of St. Stephen's School. Auditions were Saturday March 23. Jeffrey Jones-Ragona, G'ann Boyd, and Cheryl Borden will repeat their successful collaboration, which started with *The Sorcerer*.

The Board also began thinking ahead to 2003, when we will put on *The Pirates of Penzance*. As you know, *Pirates* is expensive to do right — and Rafe MacPhail will return to Austin to make sure we do it right! We even began thinking about 2005, when the Long Center will be open, with dreams of a production of *The Mikado* which all Austin will be talking about for years (at least until our next, even better presentation!).

Closer to home, time-wise, I want to thank Jennifer Burleson for keeping our web page current. Elsewhere in this Newsletter there is an article about *Pirates in School*, but I can't thank Jean & Derek Smootz enough for their hard work in organizing it. *Pirates in School* is an example of what we do for the youngest members of our community, and it is only part of how The Society has become part of the Austin arts scene in the past quarter century. ### Last Musicale

The Musicale at Westminster Manor on Monday, March 4th was a smashing success. Harris Bell Hall was jam packed; extra chairs were brought in and some people even sat on the floor. Members we never see at Musicales mingled with the regulars and the crowd of Westminster residents. The concert version of Princess Ida was a delight, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed it. Gary Hallock provided a historical display next to the stage area, and Jean Smootz set up a great sales area out in the hall (lobby) for G&S memorabilia (History, T-shirts, videos, etc.), complete with decorative pictures. Directors Arthur DiBianca, Gary Hallock, and Brad Mcrrell, with Derek Smootz, did a fine job of condensing the three acts. Andrew Hallock was the authoritative conductor, and narrator Gary Hallock made everything clear. Jeanne Stillman was the pianist, and President Larry Shepley played along on his flute, adding a pleasant melodic touch to the proceedings. In addition he served as host and welcomed the guests and introduced the show.

The 13 performers sat on the "stage," rising when called upon to sing or speak. Dialog, solos, and choruses mingled to tell the story and present the music. The characters were mainly identified by their hats, which proved to be a wonderful idea, especially since most of the audience could really only see the singers from their waists up (no risers). The exception to this was "This helmet I suppose," for which Arac was clad in rather splendid armor, which he suitably removed line by line, as he sang. There was one intermission midway in the program, which gave people a chance to stretch their legs and look over the merchandise in the lobby. At the end of the show we were all invited to partake of thie cookies and punch provided by Westminster Manor.

submitted our application for funding to the Austin Arts Commission. Their decision will be at the end of the summer, but since the money they have to allocate is based on the hotel bedtax, the current downturn in hotel occupancy means they may have less than in previous years. But I'm optimistic.

We need help getting money from other sources. If you have ideas, please call me.

The Board also voted to initiate an adopt-a-portion-of-theshow program. Look for a list of how you, too, can adopt part of our production this summer and be immortalized in the Playbill.

### **Taxes**

We have been telling people that only part of their annual dues is tax-deductible, since you can't deduct that part of the dues for which you receive benefits. Loel Graber pointed out that IRS publication 526 (which you can see by going to www.irs.gov) provides that if the basic membership dues are less than \$75 (which ours certainly are!), then you can disregard certain benefits, including token items (such as our Newsletter, presumably). If you have questions, better ask a tax consultant, but we are no longer telling people they can only deduct part of the dues when they take deductions. Our phrase now is that your contributions are deductible to the full extent of the law.

### **Pirates in School**

Our in-school program is called Pirates in School, for it tells the story of a troupe of stage people which is presenting a short version of The Pirates of Penzance — suitable for elementary school children. The program recently played at Brentwood Christian School and at Spicewood Elementary School. The company includes Janette Jones (who generously also provides rehearsal space), Jeanne Stillman (who is the accompanist), and Lara Britton, Craig Feser, Eric Peabody, and Davis Tucker. Derek and Jean Smootz organize and schedule this group. We do charge enough so that we don't lose money, but if a school cannot pay, we reduce the price, possibly drastically. Our object is not to make a profit but to spread the joys of G&S. There are some performances still to come, and more are sought.
