

#### **Last Musicale**

On Monday at 7:30 PM, on the last day of February 2005 (no Leap Year this), we gathered about 50 strong at the First Unitarian Universalist Church in two classrooms put together for the occasion. After President Bill Hatcher did the honors with introductions and thank you's, the meeting was turned over to Rafe MacPhail with Larry Shepley running the fancy projector. We embarked on a delightful and enchanted evening with one happy surprise following another, as Rafe presented *The Mikado: Red, Hot, and Swing!* 

Rafe introduced us to a period in the 1930's and 40's when a Mikado craze hit this country, and variations of all kinds appeared on the stages of New York, Chicago, and other cities. There was the *Red Mikado*, the *Hot Mikado*, the *Swing Mikado*, and several *Black Mikado*'s. Katisha was played by a black torch singer, and Yum-Yum, Peep-Bo, and Pitti-sing were referred to as the Japanese Andrews Sisters. In 1939 the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union "Titi-pu Chorus" sang the opening chorus from *The Red Mikado*, commenting on the pretty state of theatrical affairs in New York.

Rafe's extensive research on *The Mikado* has turned up a wealth of interesting concepts, and he presents them in such a light-hearted stream of ideas and images that the depth and basic truths do not weigh you down. Only later do you understand the prolonged, intensive study that went into his presentation. To put the twentieth century craze into perspective Rafe goes back to the beginnings when the first productions of *The Mikado* were staged in 1885. America went Mikado-mad and burlesques of the opera began appearing immediately. In the 1920's *The Mikado* met American jazz, which produced a new stream of emulations.

In short, in the 120 years of its existence, *The Mikado* has been adapted to a variety of presentations more frequently than any other dramatic work except Shakespeare's. That it survives these assaults and still draws an admiring audience for the traditional version is a tribute to the sturdiness of the original. Come see our traditional version in June of this year!

Forgoing the usual finishing touches ("Hail Poetry" and "Now to the banquet we press"), Rafe took a few questions, and we then all adjourned to the back of the room for the customary munchies. We hope to present this talk again in June, perhaps after our production of *The Mikado* has opened. If you didn't make it this time don't miss the June event. It is truly a wondrous experience!

It opens Friday, March 25<sup>th</sup>, and runs through April 17<sup>th</sup>, at the Dougherty Arts Center. Jeffrey also directed some music for the production.
